- In regards to them sticking out, be involved and well rounded. We don't like seeing someone purely academic and not volunteering and doing outside activities. Try to be in leadership also.

### What advice would you give about getting letters of recommendation in your specialty?

- Three letters plus the chair. Majority in the specialty

### What is the value of doing audition rotations in your specialty?

- Not necessary to match. Help you figure out the program and help the program look at you. Can definitely help, but can also hurt.

## To what extent does research, publications, or presentations affect one's ability to match in your specialty?

- Not a requirement, but can attest to how well-rounded an applicant is.

## Is a Step 2CK score needed before you will invite someone for an interview?

- I need a proven pass before I will rank them.

### What does the perfect applicant look like in your specialty?

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### Does a student need to Honor in your specialty to match?

- No, especially since all schools have widely varying criteria for this.

### The students have significant elective time during their 3<sup>rd</sup> year for career exploration.

# a. What electives would you recommend to a student who knows they are interested in your specialty?

- Cardiology, Infectious disease, MICU.

# b. What electives would you recommend to a student who is undecided but considering your specialty?

- MICU, Rheum, Cards.

# Is there anything else I haven't asked that you feel an applicant to your specialty ought to know?

- Come in with an open mind. Don't anchor on a specific subspecialty. Also, don't assume people expect you to subspecialize. Some PDs prefer an initial general medicine mindset.
