FAQs: (Orthopedics)

Given Step 1 is now Pass/Fail, what advice would you give to a first-year medical student about what they can or should be doing early on to be competitive in your specialty?

-Students can engage in research and potentially observe faculty, which can help students determine if Orthopaedic surgery is the right field for me.

Would you ever take someone with a Step 1 failure?

-While there are no absolutes in our application process, it would be highly unlikely.

What advice would you give about getting letters of recommendation in your specialty?

-Ask for letters of recommendations primarily from orthopaedic surgery faculty members, who can attest to your clinical skills. If you perform a year-long research fellowship, then you may consider requesting a letter of recommendation from your research faculty.

What is the value of doing audition rotations in your specialty?

-Sub-internships (or audition rotations) are critical for matching into orthopaedic surgery.

To what extent does research, publications, or presentations affect one's ability to match in your specialty?

-Research, publications, and presentations can help elevate a student's application and make it stand out. While research is typically an important aspect of a student's application, it is possible for a student to match into orthopaedics without research.

Is a Step 2CK score needed before you will invite someone for an interview?

-It is not needed; however, with Step 1 now pass/fail, a strong Step 2CK score will likely be a stronger factor for students to match into orthopaedic surgery than in the past.

What does the perfect applicant look like in your specialty?

-An individual with strong problem-solving skills, teamwork, integrity, reliability, focus, and grit. We utilize the student's application including, Step 2 CK score, prior work experience, letters of recommendation, personal statement, medical school transcripts, clinical rotation evaluations, and sub-internships in orthopaedic surgery to gauge these qualities.

Does a student need to Honor in your specialty to match?

-Not necessarily if the student's application is otherwise strong; however, we closely review the student's core clinical rotations, particularly for the surgical disciplines.

The students have significant elective time during their 3rd year for career exploration.

a. What electives would you recommend to a student who knows they are interested in your specialty?

-Orthopaedic surgery and any other fields the student is interested in potentially persuing.

b. What electives would you recommend to a student who is undecided but considering your specialty?

-Surgical subspecialities

Is there anything else I haven't asked that you feel an applicant to your specialty ought to know?

-The sub-internship (audition rotation) and interview are critically important to matching into orthopaedic surgery.
